The conversion from the UB-92 to the UB-04 will impact all areas of your revenue cycle operations, information technology, medical coding, and more. As the conversion process adds, modifies, deletes, and moves data fields, the automation currently achieved through system processes could be lost or invalidated. With the UB-04 May 2007 deadline, organizations realize the impact these changes can have on their internal technology systems. So what coordination is needed and at what levels?
